COMMENT, by Pete Bower Smallholder farmers

and reform programme. Smallholder agriculture. Commercial farming. Food security ~ four terms that raise the temperature of anybody contemplating the subject of farming in South Africa.

On the one hand, you have the ANC, and by extension the government, attempting to fulfil the desires of previously dispossessed families for land by expropriating or otherwise acquiring land currently owned by whites and "returning" it to its previous owners. This, by the very nature of previous land tenure, means the development of a "new" class of small farmer, and some effort is being put by government into formalising the nature of this new supposedly agrarian class.

On the other hand, it is no secret that commercial farming in South Africa is suffering. Farm security is an issue, with thousands of farmers and their families having been murdered in recent years. As one commentator recently pointed out, if a similar number of workers in any other single trade or profession (say, 4 000 plumbers, or 4 000 teachers) had been wiped out in the same number of years you can be damn sure there would have been a vigorous official response.

The drought this year has also not made farming any easier, but the real problem is the low prices paid to farmers for their efforts, particularly when viewed against the high prices paid by consumers at the other end of the food chain. The processors and retailers have got the food industry by the shorts, to the detriment of both consumers and the primary producers.

Finally, dumped imports from producers in countries that enjoy huge government subsidies mean that South African farmers are playing on a distinctly unlevel field. All of this plays a role in the question of individual, local and national food security, or the ability of families, regions and the nation at large to feed itself.

Leaving aside the political merits of the ANC-led land reform programme, will the emergence of a large new class of smallholder farmer help in the fight for food security? The answer is yes. And no.

At a family and even a regional level, the emergence of large numbers of people growing their own food should indeed ensure plentiful supply, or at least the absence of hunger, at a family and even a local level.

For if the idea works, for many \sim and let's be blunt here \sim peasant farmers, the ability to grow and sell produce and livestock is the first step to a better and more prosperous life. The key however, is in the word "ability", which implies both the will, and the knowledge and skills, to do so. At some stage the government will realise that merely rehoming families on newly-expropriated land does not constitute the development of a new class of smallholder farmer. It only means you have created a new class of homeowner, namely one whose home includes a tract of land.

Cynics might even argue that the desire by government to vigorously pursue its policy of creating a smallholder class of landowner is nothing more than social engineering aimed at deflecting attention away from the fact that it ~ government ~ has no workable plan to tackle unemployment by enabling an economic environment that creates sustainable, profitable, private-sector jobs.

To turn a homeowner with land into a productive small farmer requires training and education, access to cheap finance for the acquisition of movable assets such as tractors, irrigation equipment and annual inputs, and established channels through which to market and distribute the result.

But the vast majority of the population is urbanised, and survives on food grown and processed by others. Nobody (unless they are farmers) grows their own wheat, yet everybody eats bread. Very few people grow poultry, yet many rely on processed chicken as a source of protein.

This mass production of staples (eg, grains, sugar, meat, poultry, dairy products) is most efficiently done by large commercial ventures able to work large tracts of land which afford them hige economies of scale. This kind of agriculture is not best suited to small farmers with limited resources.

Neither is, frankly, smallholder agriculture best suited to environmental factors such as carbon emissions. A single, large, modern, fuel efficient tractor working a 1 000ha field will use far less fuel and emit far less greenhouse gas than 100 probably old, possibly Chinese, small tractors each working the 10ha allocated to 100 new smallholder farmers. Either the government hasn't realised this, or it simply doesn't care. One thing is clear, however, is that government needs to take more care of commercial agriculture if it is to ensure and guarantee the country's long-term food security.



Livestock census under way in Gauteng

province-wide livestock census is to be undertaken in Gauteng by the veterinary services division of the Gauteng Dept of Agriculture & Rural Development (GDard) between May and July. The census is aimed at establishing the size of the animal population in the province, as well as their location.

The livestock census helps the veterinary services division assist farmers with animal health management, as well

as in planning and execution of disease interventions and risk assessment.

According to GDard, only 6,2% of households in Gauteng are broadly defined as agricultural households, while under stricter definition only 2,6% are classified as agricultural households. Our own figures show that there are roughly 25 000 smallholdings in the province, and 80% of those keep some form of livestock, with 63% of the total keeping two or more species. Domestic animals (dogs and cats) and exotic pets are the most frequently kept animals, with poultry, waterfowl, sheep, horses, cattle and pigs following in that order.

However, with most of these properties being relatively small (ie smalholdings) the livestock on them, although

few in number per property, live relatively close to each other, and are therefore more susceptible to the transmission of disease from property to property than herds on larger agricultural properties.

That, and the fact that many smallholders are either neglectful or ignorant of regular vaccination and dosage requirements for their animals means that outbreaks of disease can spread very quickly, and cause considerable loss, in the region. Veterinary officials undertaking the census will go to farmers and households who have livestock to conduct the

Kyalami still battling K-road proposal

he Greater Kyalami Conservancy (Gekco), and residents of Glenferness and surrounding areas, are still locked in battle with the Johannesburg Roads Agency over the proposed K56 road, sewer line and high-density development in Greater Kyalami which, says Gekco, will cause the loss of thousands of local jobs. The K56 road is one of many that were originally planned in the 1970s when greater Johannesburg was still run on apartheid lines. The 5km section between William Nicol Drive near the current entrance to Dainfern, and Main Road in Kyalami, which it joins on the bend between Zinnia Rd and Dahlia Road, is being proposed, and although

required by the developers, it is not wanted by the majority of residents, says Gekco. "In fact, a petition against the road received 2 126 signatures from people in the area." The road cuts through the equestrian suburb of Glenferness, with an offshoot along Erling Road to the entrance of Steyn City. Gekco says: "For decades, Greater Kyalami has supported a thriving equestrian industry - in fact, it is home to the largest population of horses in the southern

hemisphere. This multi-billion rand industry contributes significantly to the economy, with thousands of full time workers employed in the area. The majority of these are horse grooms, who usually live on site with their families. In fact, on many equestrian properties, the live-in workers and their

families substantially outnumber the residents.


"These workers have minimal education but have learned very specific and important skills which allow them to find work easily in the local equestrian community. They earn a good living, usually including salary, accommodation, groceries, as well as tips from horse owners and clients


at livery yards which can add substantially to their income. Every worker supports an average of five dependants, so their earnings are playing a crucial role.

"In addition, there are hundreds of small companies in the area that service the equestrian industry, and who employ additional permanent staff. These include feed merchants, farriers, vets, equestrian clubs, horse transporters, trainers, saddlers, tack shops, arena and stable construction firms and equestrian centres such as the Shumbashaba Community Trust which offers after-school programmes for Diepsloot youth. All of these

Drought: E Gauteng rain more than last season

ith the heavy showers experienced over Gauteng in mid-May you'd be

forgiven for asking "Drought? What drought?"

For in reality the most recent rainy season was much wetter than the previous one, by more than 250mm.

For the rainy season from September to May 2016 we recorded 869mm in Eastern

Gauteng. The rainfall for the same period in 2014/5 was only 606mm.

The problem with this year's rainfall, however, was that it

fell in relatively few, heavy showers, with long periods of hot, dry weather in between. While Eastern Gauteng's Continued on page 12

will go out of business if the area is destroyed," claims Gekco.

Along with the road is a proposed sewer line, required by the Pivotal Fund, developers of the Kyalami Village shopping centre on the corner of the R55 and Main Road, but which will be used by other developers if it goes ahead.


Its route goes through a bird sanctuary in Beaulieu, and cuts through Kyalami and Glenferness, joining an existing sewer line near William Nicol Drive. The sewer line will enable highdensity development along its route, and numerous applications have already been submitted. Gekco claims. The sewer line is currently being contested in court by Gekco.

"The end result is that the ambitions of a few developers, who want to make a fast profit, are jeopardising the livelihoods of thousands who work in a unique and irreplaceable local industry. Most seriously, a vulnerable section of the population will be affected, who cannot simply relocate to a new area at will, and whose resources are already thinly stretched



bees will have solidly packed honey around this much reduced breeding area as an insulation against the penetrating cold air of the winter. The size of the entrance to the hive will have been reduced and all other leaky cracks and holes will have been sealed up with propolis to keep out winter draughts. It is most important that the hives must not be

opened during the winter thus breaking down this sealing so laboriously performed by the bees. On strong hives, the beekeeper will have removed the cold metal queen excluder between the brood chamber and supers that draws the cold into the hive and on medium and weaker hives he will have removed the super to reduce the volume of air in the hive to

be warmed by the bees. In this way the bees consume less honey stores to keep warm and the stores last much longer and well through the winter months. Windbreaks that ward off that cold south wind help to create a greater extended protection for the bees, and it is for this reason that hives in our hemisphere should always be placed on the north or northeast sides of woodlots.

All dry grass and weeds that can burn easily will have been cleared away from the hives, which themselves are highly flammable. Heat about the hives causes the wax to melt and dribble out of the hive and ignite, which then ignites the hive, and all that is left is the metal lid and four small heaps of nails from the corners of the burnt out brood boxes. Avoid standing hives on old tyres, that also burn very easily.

For the beekeeper this is a

good time to renovate and clean out all those empty hives from which bees had either died out or absconded. Wax moth will no doubt be about in some of the hives. The juicy little worms make good protein for one's egg laying hens. Now is a good time to service the honey house equipment, repair tears in one's gloves and overall, clean and renovate the smoker and service one's workhorse bakkie, because in all too short a time spring and a new season's work will be upon the bees and their master. 

Scorpions are predatory arthropod animals of the order Scorpiones within the class Arachnida. They have eight legs and are easily recognised by the pair of grasping pedipalps and the narrow, segmented tail, often carried in a characteristic

forward curve over the back, ending with a venomous stinger.

They generally eat anything they can overpower. This includes insects, spiders, other scorpions, earthworms, gastropods, as well as small reptiles, mammals and amphibians.

South African scorpions can be divided into three

> ecological categories according to their choice of habitat, namely burrowing scorpions, rockdwelling or arboreal species.

The scorpion to look out for is the thicktailed Parabuthusgenus. It can grow up to 11-14cm long. **Parabuthus** transvaalicus is one of Continued on page 22





the biggest scorpions in the family Buthidae and is usually found in areas of low rainfall



where they are grounddwelling, and dig shallow burrows at bases of shrubs, under rocks, under logs or any suitable structure. It is dark brown to black in colour and has hair on some parts of its body. This genus is found all over South Africa. It likes to dig shallow burrows in sand or hard soil and can mostly be pugnax found under logs or rocks. It will often wander into houses and can be quite aggressive.

The Parabuthus scorpion has

neurotoxic venom and its sting can be regarded as potentially lethal.

A scorpion is ready to sting when the tail with stinger is held over the head, but interestingly enough Parabuthus can also stings sideways (so never try to pick it up with your fingers).

As with all venomous Found in Gauteng: Uroplectes triangulifer encounters, some people are more at risk of serious complications such as the elderly, the immune-

compromised, allergic persons and small children. There are four scorpions commonly found in

Gauteng: Uroplectes triangulifer, Hadogenes gunning, Pseudolychas ochraceus and Opistophthalmus pugnax. They are all small, ranging from 28 mm to 70 mm and their stings are similar to that of a bee. Antivenom is not necessary.

There are some precautions that one can take. Scorpions are nocturnal, which of course means they wander around at night, so wear footwear at night. Be careful when lifting rocks and when

collecting firewood. Never handle scorpions with your bare hands. Never sleep directly on the ground when you are camping. Shake out footwear, clothes and bedding to make sure nothing crawled in. Clear clutter around your house - scorpions love to hide under rubble. If you have scorpions wandering into your house regularly, clear clutter from the floor, and shake out bedding before you get into bed at night.

Lemming offers the following advice in cases where someone has been

stung:

Keep calm. A scorpion sting does not mean instant death but you should go to a hospital as soon as possible.

Try to identify the scorpion – does it have a thick tail or thin tail?

If the victim was stung by a thick-tailed scorpion, get some medical attention immediately. There is antivenom available for scorpion

☐ If the victim was stung by a thin-tailed scorpion, Found in Gauteng: Hadogenes gunningi mild pain and local inflammation are probably the only ill-effects he or she will suffer.

☐ Put ice or a cold compress

on the sting site. Clean the wound and bandage.

☐ Give some paracetamol or aspirin for pain.

y now, all your preparations for the winter fire season should be complete. You should have cut your fields and baled, or stacked, the hay. You should have burned or ploughed firebreaks, and cleaned any remaining long grass around any fence posts and other fixtures with a

Some scorpions have the ability to produce sound by rubbing together certain body parts. This is called stridulating and is normally used as a warning sign to intruders. Arachnophobes will be sorry to hear that scorpions generally have a life span of about four to 25 years.

brushcutter.

In the vegetable patch, the last of your summer crops should have been harvested, frozen, bottled or otherwise preserved, and seedlings of your winter crop should be in the ground, covered protectively against frost.

In the future ~ late July or August ~ you can look forward to pruning and spraying your fruit trees and roses.

And so now you have six to eight weeks of early winter down-time in which to put your feet up and contemplate your navel? Well, no, you don't. Because now is the time to do the maintenance and repair tasks that one doesn't get time to do during the rest of the year when one is busy ploughing, planting, harvesting etc.

First and foremost, you have

probably used your mower for the last time this season so before you forget it, prepare it for winter.

Start by draining the remaining fuel from the tank and fuel line, using this in your tractor or another machine such as a chainsaw or brushcutter that is still in winter use. That's because

petrol, although an oil derivative, is hygroscopic ~ it absorbs moisture ~ which means that, come summer, you will experience difficulty in starting your mower using the old fuel.

If the fuel tank is made of metal coat the inside with a light machine oil to prevent





If it is an electric-start machine, disconnect the battery.

Remove the spark plug, or plugs, squirt a few drops of light machine oil into the cylinder and crank the engine by hand to coat the inside of the cylinder and the top of



the piston as protection against corrosion. Use this opportunity to clean the spark plugs, shining up the sparking faces with some fine sandpaper and checking the gap clearance. Or if the plugs are old, replace them now. Ensure you tighten the plugs back fully because you will likely forget to do so come summer if you just screw them in finger-tight now. Don't, at this stage, drain the sump and replace the oil. That's a task you'll do after your first usage of the machine in early spring, when you use the mower in dry and dusty conditions to remove much of the dry, dead old lawn growth. This is a dirty, dusty job and any dust from the resultant cloud that you will be enveloped in that enters the sump and contaminates the oil has the potential to act as an abrasive and increase the wear on the

So minimise this effect by draining the sump and

replacing the oil immediately after this first usage (which will also have the effect of loosening and mixing up any sludge in the sump already, so that the new oil you put in enters a relatively sludge-free engine.

Now is also a good time to clean or replace the air filter element.

Under the cutting deck, scrape away any caked grass and mud and generally wipe the machine down well to remove dust and dirt.

Although it makes sense to check the blades while you are grovelling around under the machine, don't replace them now unless they are irrevocably damaged. Rather, use the old blades to do your first, abrasive, dusty mow next season, when they are set as low as possible, thus abrasively making contact with uneven ground, mole hills, stones etc. Then, at the same time that you replace the sump oil, replace the blades with sharp new ones for the

rest of the season.

Of course, if there are any major repairs or replacements necessary on your mower, now is a great time, when mower repair shops are quiet, to get these done (and you'll be surprised at how few mower owners get around to doing so, rather leaving their repairs until the last moment, when the grass is already growing, in the spring, and the mower shops are frantically busy).

Finally, pack the mower away, covered in a dust sheet. Don't use plastic, which allows for "sweat" to build up under the sheet, encouraging rust.

With the machinery taken care of, it's time to look at your infrastructure. The working lives of gates and fencing can be greatly lengthened if their components are well looked after. Which means dealing with



any rust and repainting in the case of metal components, and in coating wooden components with some form of preservative.

At the same time, the integrity of fences, and their lifespan, can be enhanced if you take the time to tighten loose strands, fix any breaks and refasten strands to posts and droppers.

It is also worth noting that the galvanising ~ that coating of tin which is added to metal components and wire after manufacture to protect it against corrosion ~ is very quickly burnt off in a fire. As a result, your fire prevention preparation should include removing any combustible material (eg tall grass and weeds) growing near fences. This can be done using a brushcutter or by hand by "skoffelling" under the lowest strand of fence with a spade. When attending to metal

gates and fence posts it is sensible to have everything you will need to complete the job ready at the same time, in the form of a kit. Thus, wire brushes, scrapers and rust remover (and water to wash the residue off with), metal primer and paint brush, and top coat and paint brush. Rather than doing all the rust scraping and removal around the plot, then all the priming. then all the top-coating, rather do each component (eg gate or post) in one operation. Thus, you will scrape or otherwise de-rust one gate, wash the deruster off and allow it to dry for a few minutes, then apply the primer to the exposed spots. After a further couple of hours to allow the primer to dry, apply the finishing coat. With one gate complete, move on to the next etc.

That prevents scraped, bare metal from being exposed to

the elements, dew etc, allowing for corrosion to set in before the primer is applied. Also, for best adhesion of the paints, undercoats such as primers are best overcoated before they have a chance to dry out completely.

Once your gate and fencework is attended to, examine your irrigation and water-handling infrastructure. For a start, your fire prevention preparations should also have taken into consideration your plastic pipework which,

So, like your fences, the area immediately around your pipework should be skoffelled or cut absolutely clear of all grass and weed. At the same time, leaky taps and valves can be replaced or repaired, clamps tightened or replaced and underground leaks detected and fixed. This is particularly easy at this time of year and will be indicated by an unusually

If you have infra-red security beams in your garden your annual maintenance should include removing the covers and cleaning out the inevitable


collection of anteggs and other "goggas" that take up residence inside. Wash the covers in soapy water and dry well before refitting them, taking care to ensure that all smear marks are removed as you dry them.

With the covers off examine the connections of your comms and power cables. Because of the galvanic reaction between the copper wire and the metal connector as a result of the constant current passing through, a residue can build up which can cause a break in connectivity if not cleaned off. If you see a grey powdery residue on the wire of connector, loosen the screw, wipe both the end of the wire and the connector clean and retighten the screw. Even if the connection looks clean it makes sense to check the tightness of the connector screw.

If your transmitters or receivers are attached to trees (which grow and change shape over time) or metal poles (the bases of which can be shifted by roots and other ground movements) now is also a good opportunity to check that they are targeting their opposite lenses accurately.

mus, although they can run fast, don't need a great deal of space, so are suited to smallholding conditions.

The emu is the world's second largest bird ~ only the ostrich is bigger. They can reach 1,9m in height. Females are usually slightly larger than males and are substantially wider across the rump.

The emu is flightless, but its

legs and feet are adapted to enable it to run fast. When walking, the emu takes strides of about 100cm, but at full gallop a stride can be as long as 275cm. Its legs are devoid of feathers and underneath its feet are thick, cushioned pads. The birds can reach speeds of 48 km/h.

There are few predators capable of attacking an emu. It has sharp claws on its toes which are its major defensive

attribute, and are used in combat to inflict wounds on opponents by kicking. They are also able to jump high when attacked, so are able to get their heads and necks out of danger.

This ability will explain why it has become popular for smallholders to keep emus to

protect flocks of sheep. They are protective and territorial and can be aggressive when threatened. They are not afraid to approach a predator and perform different display signals when they see a nearby threat.

These signals let you know

that something negative is in the area: fast pace running, loud hissing, a display of jumping and running, standing tall or shrinking down.

The vocalisations of emus mostly consist of various booming and grunting sounds and must be pretty scary for a would-be thief to encounter. Some of the booms can be heard from 2km away. Emus have a powerful forward kick which can rip open clothing and exposed flesh.

If you want to keep an emu for security purposes, however, remember that it sleeps at night, so you will need to ensure that whatever it is protecting is put away safely at night as well.

The other reason for keeping emus is, surprisingly, oil production. There is a large pocket of fat on the back, as well as on the belly, which is processed into oil.

The oil is used in dietary supplements, therapeutic products and in cosmetics, depending on the grade of oil. It has external and internal use for human and animal medical conditions.

The skin, meat and feathers are also used. The meat is similar to ostrich, in that it is lean, low in cholesterol and rich in nutrients.

The birds are slaughtered at between 14 and 18 months, yielding a slaughter weight of 14kg of meat and 10kg of fat. The hides can be tanned, yielding a soft, thin leather. Not surprisingly, the eggs are large ~ on average 13cm by 9cm diameter ~ and weigh between 450 and 650g. Emptied eggs are used decoratively and are sometimes engraved with pictures. In the field, emus forage a variety of plant species, including leaves and grasses. They also eat insects and other arthropods, including grasshoppers.

They will need concentrates

as well and will eat ostrich pellets, although feed specially formulated for emus is preferable.

The female emu is ready to breed at about two years. She can lay up to 40 eggs a season, which lasts from April to October. Commercial breeders incubate the eggs, which take eight weeks to hatch.

In the wild the male emu sits on the eggs and looks after the chicks once they have

From page 37 are a couple of months old. After that they will be put into an enclosure with young of a similar age. They reach full size after around six months. The backs of their legs are covered in a hard, scaly serration that requires handlers to wear heavy gloves to protect their hands from cuts and abrasions. Camp sizes vary according to

the size and number of birds,

starting off at 5 \times 20m, ranging up to 30 \times 70m for 20 young birds. A breeding pair is kept in a camp of 10 \times 20m.

The fencing is important. Most breeders use diamond mesh to a height of 2m. Be careful to ensure that there are no jagged edges or wire knots on the inside of the fence, as the birds walk along the fence and could injure themselves.

The plumage varies in colour due to environmental factors, giving the bird natural camouflage. The juvenile plumage develops at about three months and is blackish, finely barred with brown, with the head and neck being especially dark. The facial feathers gradually thin to expose a bluish skin. The adult plumage has developed by about 15 months.

Although they are hardy, emus are vulnerable to

internal and external parasites. They have been affected by avian influenza in other parts of the world but there have been no reports of infections in South Africa, while their ratite cousins the ostriches have been casualties

As with any livestock, emus need to be carefully monitored so that any health condition can be identified early.







And they have turned on its head all the rubbish information punted by global starch and sugar processors and their cohorts, the REGISTERED dieticians (ever noticed how dieticians, before they start their strident diatribes about how low-fat-high-carb eating is far preferable and more healthy than Noakes' and Banting's suggestions always tell one that they are REGISTERED dieticians. That's like a dentist telling you, before he attacks your mouth with a drill, that he's a QUALIFED dentist. Well, hell, would you allow treatment from an UNqualified one?). My wife and I are staunch followers of the Banting way. Since changing to the diet, both of us have more vigour, are actually consuming less, feel hungry less frequently and have lost considerable amounts of weight. And not for us any more boxes of carb- and sugar-rich breakfast cereals in the morning. We consume a delicious hot breakfast which varies daily: Bacon and tomato, bacon and egg, scrambled egg, fried haddock, sardines on toast, pork sausage...

Well, pork sausage until recently... Until, in fact, I discovered what commercially-made pork sausages, and vienna sausages, polony and other processed pork products can contain. For there I was, innocently trolling around Facebook, when I came across a picture, taken in a cold room, of some cartons of frozen product (you can see the picture on Page 46, which proves that I'm not making this up). I was immediately interested to find out where these cartons emanated from, whence they were headed and, of course, what they contained. The labels clearly stated they were of USA origin, certified by no less an authority that the US Dept of Agriculture. And their contents were plain for all to see: "DEBONED PORK RECTUMS (INVERTED)"

My curiosity piqued, I immediately wondered what kind of bone it is one usually finds in a pork rectum and, more importantly what one does with a deboned pork rectum, inverted or not. Curry it? Hot chilli sauce? Deep fried in batter? And what effect does the inversion of the rectum have on the rectum? Does it, like beating a calamari steak with a mallet, render the rectum more tender?

I had no idea, and I don't think I have a recipe book that could help, so I asked my friends. One, who has spent a lifetime in the food industry, answered in a flash: "Ground up with the other ingredients, they are used as extenders in products such as pork sausage, viennas etc, to make the "real" pork go further and thus reduce the cost of the sausage."

So that's me done with processed pork products from now on.

Because while I know that pigs are remarkable for the usage of every available part (pigs' ears, deep fried, are a delicacy somewhere, my own father used to like nothing more than a plate of pig's trotters, and even I crunch down with delight on a nice piece of crackling off the Sunday roast), I'd never really thought about what happens to the very end of the animal's alimentary canal. And now that I know, I rather wish I didn't. But here'a a another thought. Somebody in the pork preparation factory must be involved in the process of

inverting the rectums.



And this reminded me of the popular Springbok Radio show in the Sixties and Seventies entitled *The Skip Show 21*, in which a panel of radio celebrities, which included, I think, personalities such as Leslie Richfield, Dennis Smith, Donald Monat, Victor Mackeson, and Evelyn Martin could ask a contestant a total of 21 questions to ascertain the contestant's job.

My father-in-law, a brickmaker by profession, entered once and was mighty proud that it took the panel 18 of the 20 questions (they were shrewd, that lot) to discover what he did.

The listening audience would be in on it from the outset, with a "ghost voice" telling listeners before the questioning started what the contestant did ("Basil from Springs is a brickmaker. He makes bricks," the voice would sonorously intone).

Now imagine the ghost voice telling the audience "Clarence from Crown Mines is a pork rectum inverter. He inverts pigs' rectums." How many questions would even the most perspicacious panel need to ask to arrive at the correct answer?


